

Children make deliciouslooking red, yellow, or green apples.

Materials

- page 184, reproduced, one per child
- page 185, reproduced one per child
- red, yellow, and light green construction paper
- · white construction paper
- crayons
- · scissors
- glue
- apple seeds (optional)

Colorful Apples


Preparation

- Prepare an art center with all materials assembled.
- 2. Reproduce page 184 on red, yellow, and light green construction paper.

 This will give you a variety of apples. Each child will choose one apple.
- 3. Reproduce page 185 on white construction paper for each child.

Steps to Follow


- 1. Children choose an apple color and then cut out the apple (page 184).
- 2. They color the other apple parts (page 185) and then cut them out.
- 3. Then children glue the apple parts to the construction paper apple.





4. Children use crayons to draw (or glue real apple seeds) in the center of the apple.

Extension

Have children describe their apples. I have a green apple. It has black seeds in the middle. Green apples taste good.









Applesauce

Preparation

- 1. Prepare a cooking center containing all the materials needed to make the applesauce.
- 2. Cut apples into cubes.

Steps to Follow

- 1. Show children the ingredients and ask them to identify each one.
- 2. Call on children to assist in measuring and pouring the sugar and water into the pot. Then allow them to place the apple cubes in the pot.
- 3. Simmer the apples for 20 to 25 minutes. Stir occasionally. (It will require much less cooking time if you are using a microwave oven.) Add more water if needed.
- 4. While the applesauce is cooking, reread "The Apple's Adventure" to children.
- 5. Ask children to share stories about some of the things they have eaten that are made from apples or other fruits.
- 6. Once the applesauce has cooled, select one or more children to spoon it into cups and distribute it to classmates to eat.

Children help turn apples into delicious applesauce.

Materials

- 2 pounds of tart cooking apples
- ½ to ¾ cup (100 to 135 g) sugar (depends on the tartness of the apples)
- ½ cup (115 mL) water
- sharp knife (for adult use only)
- small plastic or paper cups
- · plastic spoons
- large spoon
- paper towels
- · cutting board
- hot plate or microwave oven (If you use a hot plate, tape off an area where children are not to enter during cooking.)
- pot or microwave container
- · measuring cup

- · vocabulary and concept development
- · listening to and following directions
- · using small motor skills

Allowing your child to help you in the kitchen is a wonderful way to reinforce learning skills while creating family memories.



Applesauce

Materials

- 2 pounds of tart cooking apples
- ½ to ¾ cup (100 to 135 g) sugar (depends on the tartness of the apples)
- ½ cup (115 mL) water
- sharp knife (for adult use only)
- · large spoon
- · cutting board
- saucepan or microwave container
- measuring cup

Steps to Follow

- 1. Cut the apples into cubes at the center.
- 2. Allow your child to help measure the sugar and water to go into the pan and then place the apple cubes in the pan.
- 3. Simmer the apples for 20 to 25 minutes. Stir occasionally. (It will require much less cooking time if you are using a microwave oven.) Add more water if needed. While the applesauce is cooking, read the "Apple's Adventure" book your child brought home. Talk about some of the things your family eats that are made from apples or other fruits.
- 4. Once the applesauce has cooled, spoon some into a dish and enjoy!
