
Have you ever heard the idea that "there are two sides to every story"? It means that every person sees things a little bit differently. Everyone's point of view matters, including your own.

Mitra and Dylan are friends, but last Friday they were mad at each other. Mitra invited a bunch of their friends to go to the Ninja Gym on Saturday. Her parents own the gym. Dylan was mad that he wasn't invited. He walked over to her on his crutches and said, "The Ninja Gym is lame. I didn't want to go anyway!" Mitra got mad. Now they don't play together at recess anymore, and they try not to talk to each other.

Read Mitra's and Dylan's sides to the story. Write an X in the white box if you agree with or understand the point of view, even if you only kind of agree.

Mitra's side:
